'Book, Chapter, Verse'

In teaching a Bible Class, I used the following illustration: Holding up a white sheet of paper with one small black spot on it, I asked the students, "What do you see?" Many answered, "A black spot." They focused on the spot and overlooked the white paper.

'Book, Chapter, Verse! We all have heard it, and said it often. (I'm so glad that we have verse and chapter numbers.) As helpful as they are, they can be used to misapply or abuse a phrase (or verse) that is isolated. 'The point is we must not be myopic when looking at a favorite verse(s). They are not isolated statements. They are part of a greater whole: chapter and book. We must see the "paper" as well as the spot. It might help if we would see them from a different perspective: A **verse**, found in a **chapter** in a **book**.

VERSE, CHAPTER, BOOK

Start with your favorite verse, then read it in context. The context may be only a few surrounding verses, yet often the subject matter is extensive, including other chapters, even the book as a whole.

Dig a Little Deeper and Learn a Lot More

Be diligent (study KJV) to present yourself approved to God as a workman who does not need to be ashamed, accurately handling the word of truth.

2 Timothy 2:15

It's good to study your Bible. Dig a little deeper. It's being approved in all you do and all you profess and teach (word and deed).

Be faithful until death, and I will give you the crown of life.

Revelation 2:10

One needs to always be faithful. Dig a little deeper. It's remaining faithful while undergoing persecution that may result in death.

...not forsaking our own assembling together, as is the habit of some...

Hebrews 10:25

Christians need to assemble. Dig a little deeper. The full context is about what members are to do for each other and it can only be done when assembled.

Enrich your knowledge of these and other popular sayings by noting the context. You can enhance your Bible knowledge by "digging a little deeper."

However, there is a friendship that was planned, not by me, but for me. It was someone who saw something in me that He considered worth dying for. It is this friendship I treasure most-the one that has developed between the Lord and I. I see in Him a love that surpasses knowledge. I love Him because He first loved me. "My Lord and I"-that's the greatest friendship one may have. I thank God daily for it. This is a friendship that anyone may have-it's up to you.

FACTS are to be the foundation for FAITH which support one's FEELINGS. "The Bible says, I believe, I rejoice."



FAITH is **not** to be the foundation for FEELINGS supporting FACT. "I believe it to be true ..." is not an acceptable foundation.

Personal FEELINGS are **not** to be the foundation for FATH supporting FACT. "I feel it in my heart ..." is not an adequate foundation.

In each instance the feelings may be the same, but only FEELINGS based on FAITH anchored on FACT will hold up.
