Be not demanding, rather make requests. Phm.8-14

Toleration

Make allowances for personal differences.

Be patient with immature and struggling members. 1Th.5:14-15

Handle others as we wish to be handled. Mat.7:12

Praise

Make frequent expressions of recognition of another's worth or work.

There is nothing wrong and everything right with praise.

It is a misconception that praise should come *only* from God. Rom.2:29, 1Co.4:5 While we should not seek the praise of others, we need not fear it.

Gratitude

Being grateful is an expression of thankfulness. Luk.17:17

Words of thanks convey the worth attributed to favors and kindnesses received.

Admission of error

Admitting faults sets the stage for the needed correction.

Owning up to mistakes and seeking forgiveness allows other to forgive. Jam.5:16 Confession of wrongdoing to God results in forgiveness. 1Jo.1:9

Forgiveness

Members need to be ready to forgive those who seek forgiveness. Eph.4:32 It allows a brother sister to be restored back into close fellowship. 2Co.2:7-8 Members are to have the spirit of Christ: "as God in Christ has forgiven you." Mistakes will be made, expect them. We must work to correct them. Gal 6:1 Once forgiven, the past needs to be forgotten (not brought to mind).

ATTEMPTING TO HIDE SIN ONLY MAKES MATTERS WORSE

The first option only compounds the problem, the second option may be painful and humbling, but it is far better.

Ancestors

Today, we are able to trace our "roots" using the various sites available on the internet. The "electronic age" has made such research possible.

In years past such records had to be maintained by family members. During Old Testament times detailed records of one's ancestry were meticulously recorded by the Israelites. Thus, Jesus ancestry was recorded and could be easily researched.

The record of the genealogy of Jesus the Messiah is found in two places in the New Testament: Matthew's account in chapter 1, verses 1-17, and Luke's account in chapter 3, verses 23-38.

Also, the genealogies of the Israelites were very important during the year of Jubilee when, among other things, property rights were to be restored.

JUBILEE

"You shall have the fiftieth year as a jubilee ... it shall be holy to you."

Leviticus 25:11-12
[Full text verses 8-22]

"Jubilee" is derived from the Hebrew, *jobel*, the joyful shout or clangor of trumpets, by which the Year of Jubilee was announced.

PROPERTY RIGHTS

On this year of jubilee each of you shall return to his own property (verse 13).

This law by which the right heir could never be excluded, was a provision of great wisdom for preserving families and tribes perfectly distinct, and their genealogies faithfully recorded, in order that all might have evidence to establish their right to the ancestral property.
