Thoughts of Success and Failure

Unless one is convinced that he can succeed, he never will. His own thought process will insure failure. It's not that he can't succeed, he just believes he can't. Our thoughts can either help us succeed or cause us to fail.

When ballplayers give up on winning, seeking only to avoid defeat—their chance of winning fades. When they concentrate only on defense and not on offense, they will never score. Winners think in terms of "we can do it." Good players don't pass the ball to another, so they won't be responsible for the loss; they want the ball in their hands so they can help the team win. Winners visualize themselves succeeding. Losers can only see themselves failing.

This winning attitude affects everything we do in life. We must think "I can!" If we think we will never be able to be a good worker, or mate, or parent, we give up on succeeding and guarantee failure. If we think we can't be a good Christian, we throw in the towel, assuring defeat.

Being unable to visualize success plagued God's people in the Old Testament. The children of Israel failed to see how they could take over the promised land. Joshua and Caleb saw victory, the others saw only insurmountable odds. *"Then all the congregation lifted up their voices and cried, and the people wept that night."*¹ How sad. They believed they couldn't, so they were defeated without trying. Their negative thinking was the cause of their failure.

"Yes I Can!" vs. "No I Can't!"

The soldiers refused to battle Goliath, fearing failure. David believed that someone needed to defeat the giant—and he believed he could. In the end the difficult task was done by one who thought he could.

The Apostle Paul believed he could succeed. "*I can do all things through Him who strengthens me*."² This is what drove him on in the face of much adversity. He believed that with the help of God he could not lose. He didn't just try to keep converts from falling away, but he kept going to new places to spread the Gospel, increasing the number of disciples. "And thus I aspired to preach the gospel, not where Christ was already named, that I might not build upon another man's foundation."³ He believed that the crown of life was attainable in spite of all the difficulties. Not only could he receive it, but all who served the Lord faithfully could receive it.

Today, congregations must believe they can succeed in building up the body of believers, spiritually and in numbers. They must believe that they can reach the loss. They must believe that progress can be made. They must visualize success. Such vision becomes the basis for succeeding. Once a church focuses only on "holding down the losses"—rather than working to make gains, it loses its strength and it's will to succeed.

You see, believing it can be done causes one to persevere, and perseverance is what it takes to succeed.

May each congregation be filled with members who have a winning attitude, filled with visions of success. May there be no doubters or defeatists in the number.

THE SIMILARITIES

STRONG DESIRE

The desire within to reproduce the human race draws men and women together.

The desire within to sin draws a person to temptation.

UNION

When a man and woman come together a baby is conceived.

When one yields to temptation sin is conceived.

BIRTH

A baby is born

Sin is "born" (comes alive).

RESULT

A baby born results in physical life.

Sin, once alive, results in spiritual death.

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How important it is to control strong desires.

When desires are held in check, there is no union(yielding), and no offspring (sin). How important it is to keep your heart and mind pure.
