How Am I Doing?

Having seen signs like this on a number of commercial vehicles, my first thought was that the owner wanted to know if the operator was driving in an unsafe manner. The reason the sign was placed on the vehicle was so that a reckless and discourteous driver may be reported. But is this the only reason? Could there be another purpose?

After considering it for a while, I thought: "What if the driver is being extremely courteous? Would the

employer appreciate someone taking the time to write down the number and call to report good driving?"

On one occasion I place a call to commend an especially courteous driver. The person who answered the phone said, "What is your complaint?" Complaint? I said I was calling to express my approval. After a few moments of silence, a shocked, but pleased, employee took my statement.

Then I pondered, "Are we more prone to report bad behavior than good behavior?" It certainly seems easier to spot poor behavior and complain about it, than to notice good behavior and commend it.

CONDEMN AND COMMEND

Condemn and commend sound alike but are worlds apart in meaning: one deprecates, the other appreciates. While both are needed at the appropriate times to achieve the desired results, commendation is often omitted. At times we simply fail to express approval and appreciation.

Maybe it's because it takes effort to see the good in others. Maybe it's because we have a fear that such praise will produce arrogance in another (or in ourselves). Or, maybe, it is because we misunderstand or misapply the teaching of Jesus in Matthew 6:1, "Beware of practicing your righteousness before men to be noticed by them; otherwise you have no reward with your Father who is in heaven." Do we feel that in receiving praise (even if unsolicited) we may jeopardize our salvation?

Good deeds are not to be done for the praise of men. But words of praise, credit, and appreciation reinforce good behavior. They acknowledge the great value of such actions. (It must be noted that self-deprecation is a form of false humility. Running oneself down in order to feel humble is not a Bible concept.)

Paul, in his letters to churches and individuals, wrote words of praise and commendation, even to a church that had numerous

problems. Not that he overlooked their problems – he addressed them as well he should. In his first letter to the church at Corinth, in one chapter he wrote, "*Now I praise you…*" (11:2) and shortly thereafter he wrote, "*I praise you not.*" (11:22). In some things they did well, in others they did not. Paul mentions both.

Paul, in writing to the church at Rome, commended Phoebe, and many others. John, in recording what he was told to write to the seven churches of Asia, penned words of praise as well as criticism.

COMMENDATION

Commendation is sorely needed for one to maintain a proper balance in life, and to maintain a proper view of oneself. This especially applies to those who are trying to live for the Lord. When one fails to do what is right or sins, his or her actions need to be denounced. Conversely, when one does succeed in living righteously, such actions need to be recognized and appreciated.

The Lord knows the makeup of his crowning creation: mankind. He knows that poor behavior needs to be addressed, and changes need to be forthcoming. He also knows that those who strive to do right, and labor to maintain a good conscience, need words of commendation and approval. Let's imitate our Lord. Let's be as quick to commend as condemn. As ready to show our appreciation as our disapproval. As ready to praise as censure.

By all means, let's be as quick to commend as to condemn!



'Be Your Own Boss'

"Be Your Own Boss." The promotional pitch came blaring over the television. It continued with the extolling of the benefits of owning your own business. Not having to answer to a boss again. Doing things the way you think they ought to be done. Being free from the tyranny of "higher-ups." This message has appeal because it offers freedom, and freedom is a cherished commodity.

Anyone who has decided to be their own boss soon realizes that with all the independence and freedom to control your own business comes the

responsibility of making it profitable. (This fact was omitted from the commercial, intentionally or unintentionally, you decide.) But it is a fact that cannot be ignored. Many an entrepreneur has failed because the weight of responsibility was too heavy to bear.

After thinking about it, the same pitch is being broadcast concerning living. It is being advertised (promoted) "Be the boss of your life: Don't let others control you life, take charge. Don't let others tell you what to do. Rules, regulations and appear before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each one may be recompensed for his deeds in the body, according to what he has done, whether good or bad. 2 Corinthians 5:10

For we must all

morals are the 'tyrannical taskmasters' that make life a chore, if not downright miserable. The confining aspect of such 'suffocate' one's free spirit, taking the fun out of life."

The message is clear: Be free from restrictions. Do your own thing. Be one who "did it my way." It is your right to be free. Think of it, not answering to anyone for anything anymore.

To be free has great appeal. Any pitch that offers freedom will find eager listeners. But this pitch, like that of owning your own business, leaves out the one important fact: if you are in charge of your own life, then you are responsible for what you do with it.

Freedom and responsibility are Siamese twins. To have one you must accept the other. If you

are the boss of your business, or the "boss" of your life, you are the responsible party. You are the one who will be held accountable for decisions made and actions taken. As "boss" of your own life, if you hurt others, you are responsible. If you make a mess of your life, you are the one at fault. If your soul is lost, you are the one held accountable. The "buck stops with the head guy—you."

Young people need to hear this

early in life. As they assume more control over their lives, they must accept responsibility for their actions. They must understand that as they leave home and live their own lives and attain personal freedom, with it comes a great weight of responsibility. They are responsible for their actions and will have to live with the consequences, good or bad.

God created man with the ability to make his own decisions. Free-will it's called. We as the offspring of Adam have the same free-will. We may

choose to live anyway we want to live. Do anything we want to do. But as Adam and Eve were held accountable for their actions, so will we. There is no way of escaping accountability.

We need to make wise choices and exercise sound judgment, for as "boss" of our lives we will be held accountable by our peers in this life, and answer to God in the judgment.

Be your own boss— **act responsibly**. This is the message that needs to be heeded!
