But to neglect the greatest need is to fail!

BY CHURCHES BEING LAX IN DOCTRINE

Doctrine is not considered important.

Some churches "test the wind" to set forth teachings.

They adjust their teachings to reflect the state of society at the present time.

Without sound doctrine, churches are "build on sand."

2 Timothy 1:13, 3:16-17, 4:1-3; Matthew 7:26

BY MEMBERS BECOMING DOGMATIC IN THEIR OPINIONS

Being radical about a position or a belief considered "standing firm for the truth."

Preferring a "split" over "fellowship"—dividing over opinions.

Misguided attempts to keep the church pure, end up sterilizing it!

Ephesians 4:1-3. Romans 14:1,10-12. Philippians 4:2

BY MEMBERS QUARRELING AND FIGHTING

Confuse contention with "contending for the faith." Ephesians 4:26-27, James 4:7-12

BY MEMBERS BEING UNWILLING TO FORGIVE

Refuse those seeking forgiveness, thereby making sure that a barrier remains.

Matthew 6:14-15

YES, SATAN GAINS THE ADVANTAGE

When the church is polluted by worldliness.
When members are busy with other things than His.
When churches seek to attract people by "glitter" rather than the Gospel.
When "thus says the Lord" is considered radical and narrow-minded.
When members fuss, fight and splinter the body while demanding their way.
When members refuse to maintain the spirit and attitude of Christ.

The advantage is ours; the playing field is tilted in our favor **if** we faithfully follow the Lord and heed His commandments. For if God is for us, who can be against us? Romans 8:31

Jesus Christ

"I said therefore to you, that you shall die in your sins; for unless you believe that I am He, you shall die in your sins." John 8:24

And He said to them, "But who do you say that I am?" And Peter answered and said, "The Christ of God." Luke 9:20

JESUS

יהושוע Yehoshua or יהושע Yehoshua ; "the LORD is salvation.," Jeshua (28), Joshua (219).

'Iησοῦς Iēsous Of Hebrew origin; Jesus (that is, Jehoshua), the name of our Lord. The name "Jesus" is from the Greek (and Latin) for the Hebrew Jeshua (Joshua), which means "the Lord is salvation."

CHRIST

Χριστός Christos khris-tos'; anointed, that is, the Messiah, an epithet of Jesus.

ANOINTED

Anointed, the Greek translation of the Hebrew word rendered "Messiah", the title of our Lord, occurring five hundred and fourteen times in the New Testament. It denotes that he was anointed or consecrated to his great redemptive work as Prophet, Priest, and King of his people. He is Jesus the Christ (Acts 17:3; 18:5; Matthew 22:42), the Anointed One. He is thus spoken of by Isaiah (Isaiah 61:1), and by Daniel (Daniel 9:24-26), who styles him "Messiah the Prince."

MESSIAH

The Messiah is the same person as "the seed of the woman" (Genesis 3:15), "the seed of Abraham" (Genesis 22:18), the "Prophet like unto Moses" (Deuteronomy 18:15), "the priest after the order of Melchizedek" (Psalm 110:4), "the rod out of the stem of Jesse" (Isaiah 11:1, 10), the "Immanuel," the virgin's son (Isaiah 7:14), "the branch of Jehovah" (Isaiah 4:2), and "the messenger of the covenant" (Malachi 3:1). This is he "of whom Moses in the law and the prophets did write." The Old Testament Scripture is full of prophetic declarations regarding the Great Deliverer and the work he was to accomplish. Jesus the Christ is Jesus the Great Deliverer, the Anointed One, the Saviour of men.

SAVIOR

This name denotes that Jesus was divinely appointed, commissioned, and accredited as the Saviour of men (Hebrews 5:4; Isaiah 11:2-4; 49:6; John 5:37; Acts 2:22).

CONCLUSION

To believe that "Jesus is the Christ" is to believe that he is the Anointed, the Messiah of the prophets, the Savior sent of God, that he was, in a word, what he claimed to be.

It is apparent that the Apostle Paul understood this concept when he wrote in Philippians 4:11: "Not that I speak from want; for I have learned to be content in whatever circumstances I am. I know how to get along with humble means, and I also know how to live in prosperity; in any and every circumstance I have learned the secret of being filled and going hungry, both of having an abundance and suffering need. I can do all things through Him who strengthens me."

There are many things which happen about which we have nothing to say. We had no voice in deciding when we were born, the family into which we were born, or the social, cultural and economic status of that family. There are many things which we have little control over: how others treat us, what kind of diseases we will contract, our length of life, etc.

Since we exert so little control over such external things, we must learn to accept life "as is, where is." This is what produces contentment. Not that we wouldn't like it to be different. Not that we shouldn't try to improve our lot in life. It is accepting our present circumstances for now.

When we accept ourselves "as we are, where we are," we are able to face today, and gain strength to change things for tomorrow.
