MAKE NO PROVISION

Don't think about the lusts of the flesh. Letting your mind dwell on them provides fertile soil where they can grow and break out in actions.

But each one is tempted when he is carried away and enticed by his own lust. Then when lust has conceived, it gives birth to sin; and when sin is accomplished, it brings forth death. Stay away from places or circumstances where the lusts can be fulfilled. Remember, one does not go to the donut shop and just smell the donuts.

Teach Yourself

THE SITUATION

The Pharisees taught others what to do, but exempted themselves.

"The scribes and the Pharisees have seated themselves in the chair of Moses; therefore all that they tell you, do and observe, but do not do according to their deeds; for they say things and do not do them."

Matthew 23:2-3

And [you] are confident that you yourself are a guide to the blind, a light to those who are in darkness, a corrector of the foolish, a teacher of the immature, having in the Law the embodiment of knowledge and of the truth, you, therefore, who teach another, do you not teach yourself? You who preach that one shall not steal, do you steal?

Romans 2:19-21

LESSON

Teachers and proclaimers of God's word need to be careful to practice what they preach. They must live it as well teach it. Someone once said that when you point a finger at others, three other fingers are pointing back at you. One who teaches others not to be prideful is not exempt from the prohibition.

Be Not Prideful

In the parable found in Luke 18:9-14, Jesus used a Pharisee to illustrate the lack of humility.

[:9] And He [Jesus] also told this parable to some people who trusted in themselves that they were righteous, and viewed others with contempt.

[:12] "The Pharisee stood and was praying this to himself: 'God, I thank You that I am not like other people: swindlers, unjust, adulterers, or even like this tax collector."

LESSON

He was proud of himself. ("He prayed to himself"). He viewed himself as righteous and viewed others with contempt. Today, one would say he was so full of himself he could strut sitting down. His pride had blinded him. Pride can blind one today, including preachers. Once I heard a preacher say, "Some are full of pride, but they don't realize it." Sadly, he was blind to his own pride. **He failed to teach himself.**

SELF-DECEPTION



Pride's Peculiarities

Pride is a peculiar disease; it makes everyone sick but the person who has it.

"I'm not bragging, I'm just stating facts." Hmmm ... Really?

SIGHT

The Hubble telescope allows one to see what the unaided eye can not see. Electron microscopes allows one to see what the unaided eye can not see. Infrared cameras can see what the unaided eye can not see. Heat-sensing cameras can see things in the dark what the unaided eye cannot see.

In like manner the "eye of faith" helps us see things that are not visible to the human eye. With it we are able to "see more than meets the eye."

FAITH

Faith gives substance (foundation) for things hoped for. Spiritual things become real to us.

1 Thessalonians 4:14

2 Corinthians 4:16-5:10

[4:16] Therefore we do not lose heart, but though our **outer man is decaying**, yet our **inner man** is being renewed day by day. [17] For **momentary, light affliction** is producing for us an **eternal weight of glory** far beyond all comparison, [18] while we look not at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen; for the things which are seen are temporal, but the things which are not seen are eternal.

[5:1] For we know that if the **earthly tent** which is our house is torn down, we have a **building from God**, a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens.

[2] For indeed in this house we groan, longing to be clothed with our dwelling from heaven, [3] inasmuch as we, having put it on, will not be found naked. [4] For indeed while we are in this tent, we groan, being burdened, because we do not want to be unclothed but to be clothed, so that what is mortal will be swallowed up by life.

[5] Now He who prepared us for this very purpose is God, who gave to us the **Spirit** as a pledge.

[6] Therefore, being always of good courage, and knowing that while we are at home in the body we are absent from the Lord–[7] for we walk by faith, not by sight–[8] we are of good courage, I say, and prefer rather to be absent from the body and to be at **home with the Lord**.

[9] Therefore we also have as our ambition, whether at home or absent, to be pleasing to Him. [10] For we must all appear before the **judgment seat** of Christ, so that each one may be recompensed for his deeds in the body, according to what he has done, whether good or bad.

When one is spiritually myopic, judgment seems afar off. When God seems distant, one loses sight of His divine power. Weak faith and weak spiritual-sight go hand-in-hand.
